Happy Spring!

As we finally turn the corner on winter, I am guardedly optimistic we can turn the corner on COVID. However, turning the corner does not mean forgetting. Far too many people lost their lives in this pandemic, lost their livelihoods, struggled with isolation and yes, with domestic and sexual violence. As our offices begin to open up, (currently at 50% capacity) we have begun to glean lessons learned from the pandemic, including:

·Aside from COVID's medical complications, the emotional toll of the pandemic increased the level of trauma survivors experienced.
·Survivors will engage in on-line counseling and advocacy, in fact, our no-show rates were lower than in-person visits.
·Group education is effective in an on-line format.
·Survivors will find ways to reach out; they are resourceful.
·Our community partners are very generous in times of need.
·Staff are creative, passionate, and flexible in meeting the needs of clients.

At New Hope, we are assessing what these lessons mean as we move forward and the timing is fortuitous as we are in the process of developing a new strategic plan. Related to our strategic planning process, we also are examining structural inequity in our agency and our movement, as well as how these structures effect our work with survivors. Training on racial equity for staff and Board are underway. Our DEI committee, VOICES, which has been meeting since 2016, has taken the lead in this work. All of these efforts are informing our planning process.

We hope to be able to unveil our new plan in the Fall of 2021. Stay tuned.

For now, I wish you all a healthy and peaceful Spring.




